Dear Rising 6th Graders and Families,

# Reading Project Directions

**Directions:** Read one chapter book that you find interesting and that you can read independently. Choose ONE of the following projects to complete about the book you read.

All projects should:

- Reflect the students best effort - neat, organized, detailed, thorough
- Have correct spelling, punctuation and conventional grammar
- Clearly demonstrate understanding and comprehension of the book read

1. **Summary:** Students should handwrite or type a summary of the book they read. For fiction books the summary should include the characters, setting, problem, solution, and important events and details from the beginning, middle and end of the book. For nonfiction books, the summary should include the main idea and important details from each chapter, and any important information you learned.
2. **Book Jacket:** Students should create a book jacket (front cover and back cover of book). The front cover should include the title, author and an illustration that matches the title. The back cover should include a brief summary of the story, but do not give away the ending!
3. **Persuasive Poster or Essay:** Students should create a persuasive poster or persuasive essay advertising their book. This should be designed to persuade the audience to read the book by including a brief summary of the story (don't give away the ending) and a "teaser" or something that leaves the audience excited to read the book. This can be created digitally or by hand.
4. **Google Slides:** Students should create a Google Slideshow that can be used to give your audience and overview of the book. For fiction books the slideshow should include the characters, setting, problem, solution, and important information about the main idea or life lessons learned by the characters in the book. For nonfiction books, the slideshow should include the main idea and important details from each chapter, and any important information you learned. You may also include facts about the author, this is optional! \*\*This is for students who feel comfortable with Google Slides and know how to access Google Slides from home.
5. **Post Card:** Students should create a postcard from the point of view of one of the main characters in the book. One side of the postcard should be an illustration that includes the setting and matches the book. The other side should include a letter. For fiction books, the post card may be written from one of the main characters to another character, and should include information about what is happening in the characters life, the setting and the events in the story. For nonfiction books, the the post card may be written from a character in the book, OR from you! You can write the postcard to a friend, parent or teacher. Act as though you are in a location that matches up with the topic of your book, and write about the new things you have learned. Be creative!
